Women's Aid Orkney's seven key principles

Both the strategic and operational work of Women's Aid Orkney is underpinned by the seven Principles for a Fair Society. WAO understands that by using these guiding principles to assist with decision making, delivery and planning of services, the organisation is working towards building increased well-being and greater independence for individuals within the community.

- 1. **Family**—we give families the support they need to look after each other
- 2. **Citizenship**—we are all of equal value and all have unique and positive contributions to make
- 3. **Community**—we root support and services in local communities
- 4. **Control**—we have the help we need to be in control of our own life and support
- 5. **Capacity**—we are helped to be the best that we can be
- 6. **Connection**—we all get chances to make friends and build relationships
- 7. **Universal**—we all share the same basic rights and entitlements

Achievements and performance

The services WAO provide include:

- Refuge accommodation and support
- Drop in and telephone support
- Outreach for women, children and young people
- Follow-on support for women, children and young people
- Court Support Service

Women's Aid Orkney offers a reactionary and pro-active on-call service which operates 24 hours a day 365 days of the year. Women's Aid Orkney provides a place of safety for up to 4 women and their children at any one time in Phoenix House, with a total of 4 self contained flats.

The on-call telephone service is a distinct competency and, being the only service provider of refuge in Orkney, absolutely vital for women and children when they are at their most vulnerable and at risk of harm.

During the 2010-2011 year an exit plan was implemented in order for Women's Aid Orkney to revert back to full independence as of the 1st of April 2011. Voluntary Action Orkney had managed Women's Aid Orkney for the previous three year period.

Under VAO's management, WAO has been able to successfully move forward to develop a robust and comprehensive service, now with the leadership, drive and commitment of the Board, Manager, Staff and Volunteers, the organisation will move forward once again, from the 1st of April 2011, as an independent organisation.





Finance

Incoming resources for the year totalled £262,853. Total resources expended amounted to £233,970. Therefore funds increased by £28,883 over the course of the year. At the 31^{st} of March 2011, the overall balance of funds was £142,655 of which £24,164 was held for restricted purposes.

The Directors have examined the requirement to maintain free reserves and concluded that the most appropriate level is between six and nine months operational expenditure. The Directors consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities whilst consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

Refuge and Outreach Services

Throughout 2010-2011 the flexible, responsive and professional services offered by Women's Aid Orkney have seen:

- 56 women supported through Outreach—a 60% increase on previous year
- 9 women supported through Refuge / Follow On—no change on previous year
- 13 women have been housed at Phoenix House
- Occupancy rates for Phoenix House overall for 2010-11 was 82%
- 18 children and young people were supported through the Outreach service
- 7 families have been admitted through the on-call telephone service

Web-site and IT

The Women's Aid Orkney website continues to be revised and updated to become more user-friendly, relevant and accessible. The total number of hits has increased from 28342 (2009-10) to 30276 (2010-11) - an increase of over 6.5%.



Towards the end of this financial year, Women's Aid Orkney was organising the upgrade of their IT system to include a server and purchasing the domain name www.womensaidorkney.org.uk.

The website at www.orkneycommunities.co.uk/womensaid will continue to be used, with any user accessing www.womensaidorkney.org.uk being automatically redirected. As a result of this upgrade, all email addresses will be @womensaidorkney.org.uk, adding to the corporate identity of Women's Aid Orkney as an independent organisation. These upgrades are due to take place early in the 2011-2012 year.

Respect Programme

Throughout the year, the Respect Preventative Education Programme was delivered to 282 pupils in schools across Orkney including Sanday, Stronsay and Papa Westray.

As a result of the service delivery which is undertaken by WAO, children and young people are able to achieve an increased understanding of how best to develop and maintain healthier relationships with their peer group, family, friends and individuals within the community. Children and young people are encouraged to take responsibility for their actions and how these impact on others around them as well as the environment. In the appropriate manner the ethos within the UN Convention on the Rights of a Child is strongly embraced and reinforced to children and young people within the service as are their responsibilities to others. The breadth of the materials and resources used, as well as workers' encouraging and responsive approach, allows this outcome to be achieved through their real belief in helping C&YP to build positive and healthy relationships both within their families and within their communities.

Publicity and Fundraising

The board of Directors decided to form a Fundraising Sub Group to develop and implement a positive and pro-active approach to Fundraising which was thought to be especially important in the current financial climate.

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The first Fundraising event was a "pop-up" charity shop called "Good as New" which was open for a two week period at the end of Bridge Street in March 2011. There was huge support from the community for this project and the shop was manned entirely by volunteers; it was a tremendous success raising a total of £2557. The Board of Directors decided that these monies would form the basis of a Hardship Fund which could support clients who find themselves in real hardship.

Other fundraising activities, including an Orkney version of "Strictly Come Dancing", are planned for 2011-2012.

Along with 26 other organisations, a promotional and fundraising opportunity was taken by having a stall at the Charities Christmas Bazaar. £133 was raised to support WAO's work.

Towards the end of this financial year, Women's Aid Orkney was contributing to, and assisting with, the organisation of an event to mark International Women's Day, due to take place early in April 2011.

Children and Young People's (C&YP) Services

During 2010-2011, 18 children and young people received outreach support, 7 were supported whilst resident in Phoenix House and 1 child, having lived in Phoenix House in the past, received follow-on support.

C&YP Workers focus on assisting the child or young person in achieving the following outcomes :

- 1. C&YP's diverse needs are being met better
- 2. C&YP have more involvement in decisions made about them
- 3. C&YP have an increased understanding of how to maintain and develop healthier relationships
- 4. C&YP have a better understanding of their feelings and how to deal with them
- 5. C&YP have increased understanding of domestic abuse and how it effects themselves and others
- 6. C&YP feel safer

All of the work that the Children and Young Person's workers do with the children whom they support is led by the children and young people themselves, by the C&YP identifying the specific issues with which they need support. This then allows them to jointly design an individual support plan to meet their needs with ongoing monitoring and evaluation being undertaken routinely in order to chart progress.
